

Branch Commissioning Anniversaries: Congratulations go to Spalding Branch (No 9 Area) and Torbay Branch (No 4 Area) for celebrating respectively their 60th & 75th Anniversaries of their Commissioning. Unfortunately, due to Covid, Torbay had to wait a further 2 years to celebrate. A BZ to both Branches. As a reminder, commemorate certificates are available from Central Office to acknowledge a Branch's 21st, 30th, 40th, 50th etc anniversary of Commissioning. When required, please make your request as early as possible. As mentioned elsewhere in this month's circular and last week's Semaphore Short, Cork Branch is still seeking donations towards its HMS MARS Appeal to refurbish the memorial and 9 Graves in Cobh Cemetery. A peace time gunnery exercise aboard the Ship in 1902 resulted in an explosion killing 11 men. Being a peacetime incident, the upkeep of the graves does not come under the responsibility of the Commonwealth War Graves Commission. Two of the men's bodies were repatriated by their families back to England. The memorial and headstones are now looking sad and in need of refurbishment. Donations no matter how small will be appreciated and should either be sent to Central Office either by cheque payable to 'Royal Naval Association' marked "HMS MARS" on the reverse or via Bank transfer to Sort code: 60-05-14 Account No 29671612.

Behind the scenes at Central Office & Membership news: Our Team of staff at Central office continue to be maxed out with work beavering away on all fronts with the continued flow of new memberships, planning the 3 months ahead regarding the National Standard Bearers Competition, F40 weekend, National Conference plus the normal administration tasks associated with running and supporting *probably the 2nd best club in the world* – please do not ask what the Best Club is! As requested before, please do not always expect an immediate response to an enquiry as the *busy sign* is no doubt hanging on the office door. Give a little slack, and if necessary, follow up with a polite reminder.

Branch Admin – Can I remind Branch Secretaries to ensure their Year End Branch Returns are submitted to Central Office no later than 30th April – Branch Bye-Law B19 (c) refers. This must be confused with the Annual Return required by the Charity Commission if your Branch is registered as a charity other than under the RNA's national charity No 266982.

Branch Standards Cover. Branch Treasurers are requested to ensure the annual cover fee has been paid to Central Office. For several years the Association has had a scheme to *self insure* Branch Standards against Damage or Loss for an annual fee of £5. If your Branch has not paid this annual fee, or is in arrear for not having paid it, then a claim is likely to be rejected.

National Council Members (NCM's): Just to say that this year there will be several new faces sitting around the National Council Table as a result from last year's elected candidates', and this year's elections which are taking place. These are important positions as NCM's are also National Trustees of the RNA. Whilst no problem exists with NCM nominees, we do occasionally experience problems with Areas not having a Deputy NCM. Hopefully, come June at National Conference all 13 NCM & DNCM posts will have been filled. It must be noted that if your Branch or is to have a voice at National Council, then your Area needs to be represented.

In December I mentioned having spent four hours Sea Time aboard HMS BELFAST. At the end of February, I spent a further 5 hours Sea Time onboard, supplemented by Bill Oliphant and myself having experienced further Sea Time on the Torpoint Ferry (clunk clunk clunk) when we travelled to Oggie Land to visit HMS RALEIGH to meet training staff and the RNA voluntary Mentors. A most interesting visit with the establishment beginning to get back to a normal Post Covid routine. As of 1st March, some 590 recruits were undergoing training. Bill and I got the opportunity to sit in on a presentation with 60 recruits which Bill spoke about the role of the RNA. I was most impressed that 1/3rd are to serve on Submarines, 1/3rd to serve with the Fleet Air Arm, and General Service 1/3rd. The young lad sitting alongside me apologised for not having known about the RNA as he would have paid for his late Granddad, a former RN Man to have been a member of the RNA. Another newly super excited qualified Seaman who I spoke with was flying out on 3rd March to join HMS MONTROSE in Bahrain. All in all, the lads and lasses were thrilled to be joining the Best Club in the World.

Well Shipmates, that is it for now. To all serving Shipmates including reservists, maintaining the peace, and keeping the sea lanes open, keep up the good work, we are thinking of you. To all Shipmates and your families in the UK and throughout the world keep safe. For those at sea, a safe return.

3. ★ RNA Cork and County Branch - Assistance Please - HMS Mars Project

Shipmates RNA Cork and County Branch would appreciate your assistance and are appealing for funds to enable them to refurbish the HMS Mars Memorial to coincide with the anniversary of the tragic accident 120 years ago.

Very tragically twelve Royal Navy sailors were killed when a gun exploded on HMS Mars during gun practice off the coast of Ireland on the 14th of April 1902. Two of the casualties were buried at sea, one of the sailors was repatriated to the south of England and the remaining nine of the sailors are buried in Cobh, County Cork.

As you can imagine, the intervening years have taken their toll on the headstones and professional help is required to refurbish them. As this disaster occurred during training and was pre-war, none of the statutory bodies will consider grant aid towards the refurbishment.





The actual cost of refurbishing the headstones is in the region of $\notin 2,500$ and it is beyond the small local Branch to cover it. Any assistance with this very worthwhile project would be greatly appreciated by the shipmates of Cork & County Branch.

A very kind invitation, for 12 RNA Members, has been received at Central Office from the Naval Base Commander, Commodore J J Bailey Royal Navy to attend the Naming Ceremony of the Royal Navy's newly acquired Jack-Up Barge (JUB) which will take place in Her Majesty's Naval Base Portsmouth on 4 April 2022 from 0930-1130.

The JUB, which was procured from Ravestein BV in the Netherlands will be used for the lifting of Hunt Class warships for delivery of their deep maintenance projects delivered from within the Ship Hall. This unique and critical asset will provide reduced upkeep duration and cost, achieving greatly improved ship availability.

The vessel will be named Typhoon 3000 in recognition of RMAS Typhoon's contribution to the Falklands conflict 40 years ago. Typhoon, under the command of Captain John Morris, who was later relieved by Captain Bruce Stephens, was the first ship to sail south, departing Portland Naval Base on 4 April 1982, with a civilian crew augmented with Royal Naval personnel. She returned home on 24 September 1982 after providing essential and sterling logistics support, including transferring fresh water to the Task Force,



playing a key role in the preparations for the San Carlos landings and towing RFA Sir Galahad out to sea to be scuttled.

10. **★** Decorative Ropework – Special Interest Group

Ex Buffer, Shipmate Bob Jones, Vice Chairman at Portsmouth Branch is organising a Decorative Ropework Special Interest Group and would like to invite interested Shipmates to contact him with a view to getting this group up and running.

Decorative ropework (tiddly ropework in "Jack speak") Was one of the mainstays of lower deck life on board sailing ships, being a hobby that offered almost unlimited materials and little else to do when off watch and not working ship. Ships of the line would carry in excess of twenty-five miles of natural fibre cordage of one type or another. This would regularly be renewed so there was plenty of "old stuff" to go around.



Many books are available on the subject and there are literally thousands of knots to choose from. Many of these were working knots, bends and hitches used in the rigging of sailing ships.

Sailors would use their knowledge of these knots to produce items of a decorative nature to enhance the look of their ship or make items for themselves. Examples of these are knife lanyards, coverings for knife handles, sea chest handles, ship's bell ropes, coverings for officers' telescopes and many other items.

This practice has largely disappeared in today's Royal

Navy mostly due to coming of modern entertainment available on ships. Also, the seaman branch in the Royal Navy is, these days, very small compared to the days of sail when they were the largest branch on board by far.

The basic material has also changed almost beyond recognition. Then, it was mostly hemp and manilla rope and various twines, all made of natural fibre. Today almost all cordage on ships is man made with nylon and other modern materials. The advantages of these new materials are that they come in a variety of colours and textures. However, by and large they are more expensive.

Like most things, this subject goes from the very basic and simple, such as macrame, up to the highly complex such as star knots, etc. Work such as grafting, senniting and matting are also included in this subject. Much good work can be achieved by using simple knots. From these beginnings more complex work can be attempted. This hobby can be likened to stamp collecting in as much as people swap knots with each other therefore building up their repertoire.

A small number of people are keeping this art alive. An organisation calling themselves "The International



Guild of Knot Tiers" is an example of this. RNA members visiting the dockyard in Pompey can see some of this work being carried out in number 6 boathouse (the restaurant). This work is being done by an ex-Leading Seaman who makes a reasonable living selling his items. A similar set-up can be found in Chatham Historic Dockyard as part of the working ropery.

If we can establish a special interest group we will be helping this almost forgotten art form to remain as part of the Royal Naval tradition.

Should we get a special interest group going I see it as doing two things.

- 1. A gathering together of members who already count this as a hobby and are proficient at it.
- 2. People who are unfamiliar with it but would like to learn.

15. ★ Further information concerning Operation Mincemeat (Dec 21 Edition)

Shipmate Phil Mountain from City of Newport Branch forwarded further revealing information to Central Office concerning the article on Operation Mincemeat in the December 21 Edition of the Semaphore Circular.



S/M Phil was interested to read in December's circular about the new memorial to Operation Mincemeat recently erected in Hackney. There is a connection to an existing memorial in Wales. The article didn't mention that "the dead body dressed as a fake Royal Marine officer" was Glyndŵr Michael, a miner's son and native of the Rhymney Valley, Gwent. His sad and lonely demise in London in January 1943 was crucial to the creation of the imaginary Major William Martin, Royal Marines.

On 30 April 1943. the captain of HM Submarine Seraph (P219), Lieutenant Norman Jewell, read Psalm 39 ("O spare me, that I may recover strength, before I go hence, and be no more") and Michael/Martin wearing Royal Marine battle-dress and insignia was

gently pushed into the sea off the Spanish coast with a briefcase padlocked to his wrist. The body was recovered by a local fisherman and the Fascist authorities, as expected, passed on details of the fake secret documents he was carrying to the Nazis.

After the deception was complete, the non-existent Major Martin was buried with full military honours in Nuestra Señora Cemetery, Huelva. In 1998, the British Government revealed Martin's true identity, and the epitaph: 'Glyndŵr Michael; Served as Major William Martin RM', was added to the gravestone. In 2002, the Royal British Legion and village of Aberbargoed dedicated a commemorative plaque to Mr Michael on their impressive War Memorial gates.

I am a Mesothelioma Clinical Nurse Specialist based at Queen Alexandra Hospital in Portsmouth and am contacting you about the 'Mesothelioma UK – Supporting Our Armed Forces' service for armed forces personnel and veterans that may be of interest to your members.

Mesothelioma UK is the national charity for the asbestos-related cancer, mesothelioma. Mesothelioma is perhaps the most challenging cancer known to man and sadly the UK has the highest incidence in the world of this avoidable cancer. The charity is dedicated to providing specialist information, support and education and to improving care and treatment for all UK mesothelioma patients and their carers.

Since starting the Supporting Our Armed Forces project in 2017 with LIBOR funding from the Government we have focussed on raising awareness of asbestos exposure in the military, campaigning against the inequalities in compensation available to veterans and developing bespoke information for veterans diagnosed with mesothelioma. https://www.mesothelioma.uk.com/armed-forces/ We also undertook a research study into the experience of mesothelioma in military personnel - The Military Experience of Mesothelioma Study (MiMES). The purpose of MiMES was to generate insights into the experience and health/support needs of British Armed Forces veterans with mesothelioma and identify how best health professionals and support agencies can support them https://www.mesothelioma.uk.com/wp-content/uploads/dlm_uploads/2021/02/MiMES_Report_FINAL.pdf

The project was awarded a prestigious Health Service Journal award in the Military and Health Service Partnership category in 2020.

We are also raising funds to site a memorial to veterans and serving personnel at the National Arboretum in Staffordshire. I have attached some information regarding this.

RNA Stowmarket Branch

In the film *The Cruel Sea*, which follows the lives of a group of Royal Navy sailors fighting the Battle of the Atlantic during the Second World War, with their ship, the Flower-class corvette *COMPASS ROSE* having a starring role. Flower-class corvettes were built to escort convoys, and in February 1942, Stowmarket Urban & Gipping District Councils adopted their own such corvette during Warship Week. Just one of many communities throughout the country who did likewise and adopted their own ships. *HMS BORAGE* would go on to earn six battle honours during her distinguished service.

Commodore Bellfield gave an informative talk about the role of today's Royal Navy, which was followed by the presentation to Councillor Scarff



of a specially commissioned ship's crest on hardwood, with a brass plaque reading, "Presented to the town of Stowmarket by Stowmarket Royal Naval Association, to mark the 80th anniversary of the adoption of HMS Borage – 18th February 2022."



We were delighted to have three naval veterans from the same family, all still living in Stowmarket, present the crest to Councillor Scarff. Vic, Nick, and Liam Huffee. Dad, son, and grandson. The ship's crest will be placed alongside the plaque presented to Stowmarket Urban & Gipping District Councils in March 1942, which to this day hangs in Stowmarket's town council offices.

Both Councillor Scarff and Lea spoke of their thanks for having been invited to the evening, with Councillor Lea's, husband's father having served in the Royal Navy.

Through ticket sales and the generous support of Associated British Ports, D S Mead Ltd, Tothill Services Ltd, a sailor's mum, and holding a raffle and auction on the night, in addition to the money



raised by Stowmarket RNA at their Trafalgar Night Dinner last October, a total of £1,600 will be heading to the Royal Navy & Royal Marines Charity, the principal charity of the Royal Navy, supporting sailors, marines and their families, for life.

The following message was received from Commodore Bellfield after the event.

"Thank you so much for the invitation to join you for your dinner in celebration of the adoption of HMS BORAGE. You had clearly put so much time and effort into the arrangements and despite the dreadful weather – it was a delightful evening. It was good to meet so many of the branch and the other guests – lots of connections made.

May I wish you all the best as you emerge from COVID and return to normal operations."

Further information: BORAGE was one of twenty ships and vessels adopted by communities across Suffolk following Warship Week in 1942 and remained in service with the Royal Navy until 1946, when she was handed over to the Irish Navy, who she remained with until 1970.

A total of 294 Flower-class corvettes were used by Allied navies during WW2, with 33 being lost in action. Between them, they sank 47 German U-boats and 4 Italian submarines.

Between 1941 and 1942, the concept of National Savings was introduced by the British government. Each region in the country was provided with a savings target to achieve. This was based on the region's population, with each general level of savings having a class of warship assigned. This became known as Warship Week, due to its similarities with War Weapons Week – which was a drive to replace the material lost at Dunkirk through a savings campaign. The total amount realised in the weeks specifically designated Warship Weeks was £545,640,770. The equivalent of £24.6 billion in 2019.

James Alexander Macleod – Royal Navy WW2 Veteran (Portadown RBL Branch)

In the world today we often hear celebrities and sporting stars described as "brave and heroic," all this while true heroes keep their brave actions to themselves. Living quietly in the Kernan area of Portadown, we find a true, brave and heroic man, Jim MacLeod; for 97-year-old Jim, a holder of the Burma Star, is one of only two known remaining Portadown veterans of the Second World War. The other veteran being Muriel Nevin who served with Women's Royal Navy Service, Muriel served in A36 and A37 Fleet Air Arm Squadron, based at Maydown Airfield on Lough Foyle.

Jim MacLeod was born in Scotland; the MacLeods' originally hailing from the Isle of Skye, where the family had a long association with the sea. Jim's father was a Scotsman, his mother a lady from Northern Ireland. In 1943, after completing his apprenticeship, 20-year-old Jim volunteered for service, with his engineering skills and family background, Jim was quickly snapped up by the Royal Navy.

After completing his training, the now Petty Officer Jim MacLeod set sail for the Far East, which would be no cushy number since the war against Japan was in full swing at this time. Here, Jim would serve both on ship and shore stations, recently recalling how he took part in mine sweeping operations off the Philippine Islands. While serving on the heavy cruiser H.M.S. London, Jim engaged in sea battles with the Japanese navy. Like the majority of veterans, Jim skipped quickly over these nightmarish artillery battles. For him, he was only doing his duty like all the other young men and women of his generation; instead, he prefers to remember his shipmates and the fun times they had together.

As we approach the seventy-fifth anniversary of VJ-Day on 15th August, it is hard for us today to imagine the happiness and relief experienced by Jim and his shipmates on that day. As the Petty Officer, it was his duty to distribute the rum ration onboard ship, a duty that quickly made him everyone's friend, and as the news of the Japan's surrender broke, Jim recalls with a laugh and a cheeky smile that there were more than a few extra rum rations taken that day.

It was now after Japan's surrender that Jim experienced an event the horror of which has never faded from his memory. His ship received orders to dock at Singapore to take onboard Allied prisoners of war. Many war crimes had been committed against these men and women, making them almost unrecognisable, some little more than skeleton figures were taken onboard. While being witness to the true horror of war, this experience was also one of the most rewarding of Jim's time in service. His ship was now a rescue ship, repatriating hundreds back home and into the arms of their loving families; families that many believed they would never see again.

Jim tells the story of his time in Singapore which shows how despite his age and experiences, his sense of humour has never faded. Coming ashore, Jim and his shipmates encountered what seemed like endless lines of Japanese prisoners discarding their weapons as they marched into captivity. Spotting a prized war souvenir, Jim helped himself to a Japanese officer's sword. The sword made its way back to Jim's home in Glasgow, and as Jim recalls, he had to destroy it a few years later because younger family members kept playing with it, not realising just how dangerous this sword could be.

After the war, Jim maintained his love for the sea, serving for a number of years in the Merchant Navy. Life onboard ship, shipmates, travelling and the smell of the fresh salty sea air brought happiness and contentment to Jim for many years.

The young sailor would find love, marrying Sarah (Sadie) settling down and having two daughters. His daughters would both marry men from Portadown. It was as a result of this that Jim and Sadie moved to Portadown in the late 1970's to be close to their family.

Jim had always been a member of the Royal British Legion in Scotland, and this continued as he became a very active member of the Portadown Branch. The love of all things military also resulted in Jim becoming a member of the Royal Irish Fusiliers Old Comrades Association. He enjoyed his time with those with which he shared a common service history.

Today, 75 years after the victory over Japan, Jim does not claim to be a hero. A modest family man, he keeps his war memories to himself. Despite this, the Portadown Branch of the Royal British Legion are proud to have this man as a member; while he does not seek praise, the Portadown Branch of the Royal British Legion would like to thank this true hero, a man who by his actions helped free the world from Fascism and Tyranny.

19th	1847	Admiralty order that Wednesday 24 March be observed as a Day of Public Fasting and Humiliation, Divine Service to be specially performed in recognition of Irish Famine. Reaction of ship's companies and their pursers not recorded.			
20th	1832	Navigating, Medical and other non-executive officers adopted the uniform jacket of the Executive branch, distinguished by the pattern of their button.			
21st	2007	Explosion of a self-contained oxygen generator (SCOG) in submarine <i>Tireless</i> while submerged under the Arctic ice killed two crew members.			
22 nd	2003	Two Sea King Mk VII of 849 Sqn A Flight, flying from <i>Ark Royal</i> on vital ground surveillance missions to support Royal Marines ashore on the AI Faw peninsula, collided over the northern Arabian Gulf. Two pilots and five observers killed. Posthumous MiD to observer,Lt Tony King. Operation Telic.			
23 rd	1922	Submarine H42, Lt D.C. Sealy RN, sunk with all twenty-six hands in collision with the destroyer <i>Versatile</i> , Cdr V.L.A Campbell RN, during 3rd Submarine Flotilla tactical exercises with the Atlantic Fleet off Europa Point, Gibraltar. The submarine surfaced 40yds ahead of the destroyer which was steaming at 20 knots.			
24 th	1960	<i>Yarmouth</i> , first of nine Rothesay-class antisubmarine frigates, commissioned at John Brown's, Clydebank, by Capt H.R. Hewlett RN, shortly to be Captain (F) Sixth Frigate Squadron. The first ship to be equipped with the new Seacat missile.			
25 th	1945	World's first deck landing of a high-performance twin-engined aircraft; a de Havilland Mosquito Mk 6 from RAE Farnborough on <i>Indefatigable</i> off Ailsa Craig and Arran piloted by Lt-Cdr Eric 'Winkle' Brown RNVR.			
26 th	1912	Leonard James Callaghan, later Lt RNVR and Prime Minister, born at Portsmouth.			
27 th	2006	The last Sea Harrier FA2 squadron, 801 NAS, paid off at RNAS Yeovilton, having completed operational flying on 9 March.			
28 th	1996	RM School of Music, Deal, closed and band training moved to old RNDQs in Portsmouth Dockyard. RM at Deal since 1861.			
29th	1968	The beginning of the end of the fathom. The first of the new metric Admiralty charts, No. 3105 of Chiba Ko in Tokyo Bay, published, with depths and heights shown in metres and decimeters. This was followed on 5 April by Chart 2247 of ports in the Black Sea, and on 12 April by Chart 438 of Boulogne.			
30th	1912	Capt Robert Falcon Scott RN and the remainder of his party died in the Antarctic. 'It seems a pity but I do not think I can write more.' 'For God's sake, look after our people.'			
31st	1956	HMS <i>Siskin</i> , RNAS Gosport, paid off and following day commissioned as HMS <i>Sultan</i> as a TE for ratings of the Mechanical Engineering Branch. The new establishment was named after the old ironclad <i>Sultan</i> which served until 1943 as the RN mechanical training ship in Portsmouth Harbour.

Each Branch nominating a Delegate shall send details to the Council **to arrive not less than one week before the date of Conference.** A Branch may change its nominated Delegate provided the Council is notified not less than twenty four hours before the Conference.
