
Shipmates would also wish to know that messages of condolence have been received from many of our sister organisations in Europe whom we maintain

Dear Sir Edward

We make this approach through you as Her Majesty the Queen was our revered Patron

I should be grateful if you might convey to The King on behalf of the Royal Naval Association - members and officials - our sincere and heartfelt condolences. We are all deeply saddened by the news of the death of Her Majesty. His Majesty may also be comforted to know that many of our sister veteran organisations across Europe in the International Maritime Confederation, have been in touch to express their sympathies.

For centuries the British monarch has been the head of our nation's Armed Forces, however, as His Majesty is well aware, the Royal Navy has enjoyed a particularly close relationship with Her Majesty with generations fore and aft as daughter, wife and mother of Royal Navy Officers. Indeed, we understand the Queen describes her days as a naval wife in Malta, where her husband the Duke of Edinburgh was serving in the late 1940s, as amongst the happiest in her life.
