

FIRESIDE CHATS Monday evening's Fireside Chat (October 23rd) will be a talk entitled 'the Convoy' and will be presented by Angus Konstam. The subject of the talk will be the WWII Convoy HG-76 which sailed from Gibraltar to Britain in December 1941 and was seen as the first really successful convoy of the war due to developing anti-submarine tactics and equipment and the use of new escort carriers for air defence. Please note that at present, (but subject to change) there will be no Fireside Chat on Monday 30th October. TRAFALGAR DAY As many you will all be aware, tomorrow marks the 218th anniversary of the Battle Of Trafalgar. As a former CO of HMS Victory, this is always a poignant time of year for me and I will be onboard on Saturday morning for the annual commemoration ceremony. A couple of days ago, I was in Gibraltar and visited the Trafalgar Cemetery, which despite its name, only contains the bodies of two people who died as a direct result of the battle. Lieutenant William Forster, of HMS Colossus who died on the day of the battle and Royal Marine Captain Thomas Norman who died on the 6th of December 1805 of wounds sustained in the battle on HMS Mars. Of course the vast majority of those that actually fell on the day were buried at sea, then and there, with the notable exception of Vice Admiral Lord Nelson. The cemetery does have a number of headstones of others that did die after the battle and who were buried at St Jago's cemetery, near the Charles V wall but now no longer used. Their bodies remain there.
