



WARM WELCOME BACK HOME

Britain's premier Naval deployment of 2025 ended this month with the ships and aircraft of the UK Carrier Strike Group returning home.

Families and well-wishers gathered at Naval and air bases across England to greet more than 2,000 military personnel – sailors, soldiers, aviators, Royal Marines, and civilians – back from the eight-month Operation Highmast deployment that stretched as far as Australia.

The group was led by the nation's flagship, aircraft carrier

HMS Prince of Wales, which sails into Portsmouth a day ahead of schedule to avoid forecast foul weather.

She was accompanied on the final stretch by two of her escorts, destroyer HMS Dauntless and Norwegian frigate HNoMS Roald Amundsen.

A third escort, frigate HMS Richmond, sailed into Plymouth, while the force's aircraft flew off early to their respective air bases – F-35B Lightning fighters to RAF Marham in Norfolk, Merlin helicopters to RNAS Culdrose near Helston

in Cornwall and RNAS Yeovilton in Somerset, and four Wildcat helicopters to Yeovilton.

Tanker RFA Tideforce, which supported the final month of the deployment, returned to Portland, while sister ship RFA Tidespring, which provided fuel for the force through much of the deployment, remains deployed. The deployment was also supported by Norway's HNoMS Maud during the opening weeks.

The arrivals bring to an end Operation Highmast, but marks the start of a new chapter, with the strike group having been declared fully operational and ready to assume NATO duties.

"It has been a privilege to lead the nearly 4,000 soldiers, sailors, aviators, and marines who have sailed over 40,000 nautical miles as part of the Strike Group, working with over 30 nations en route," said Cdre James Blackmore, Commander UK Carrier Strike Group.

"The Strike Group has come home stronger for NATO than it departed and I am incredibly proud of all those who have taken part in Operation Highmast."

Cdr Nick Smith led 809 Naval Air Squadron, nicknamed The Immortals, on its maiden deployment, bringing them back to Norfolk alongside their RAF Lightning squadron 617 counterparts.

"The range and breadth of the activity the squadron have been part of is truly amazing," said Cdr Smith.

"I am incredibly proud of the Immortal Team who have done such a fantastic job in delivering everything asked of them throughout the year, but most importantly full operating capability of Carrier Strike.

"We have operated day and night, in fair weather and torrential downpours, from HMS Prince of Wales as well as the Japanese and Italian ships Kaga and Cavour"

Onwards to our 76th Anniversary... In terms of **Remembrance**, I was so proud and honoured to represent our Association at the Remembrance Parade in Whitehall. You may be interested to know that on the Thursday before the parade the Wreath 'Gang' all gather at Wellington Barracks for training. We were under the command of the 'National Treasure and Drill Oracle' himself, Garrison Sat Maj (GSM)WO1 Andrew 'Vernon' Stokes – what an honour – and he 'picked me up' for being too military in my right turn. What an honour being re-re-briefed by Vern Stokes! I put it down to the

Following that is **FUN**! Post Remembrance, I had the absolute pleasure of attending Aldershot Branch Pickle Night as the Guest of Honour. What a superb evening - shame the choir needed a few more weeks, especially S/M Mick Mills rhythm on the accompanying fruit box... (only joking!) Seriously, BZ to all the Shipmates to a man/woman for dressing up immaculately. This is exactly what the RNA is about.

Next is **Signposting**. I have the pleasure of providing 'The National Chairman's Christmas Pressie' which could make your Christmas! It could be you... If you served from 1975 and completed five years reckonable service and are not in receipt of a full MOD pension you may be entitled to a preserved pension at age 60. Please see the example below. Remember, most importantly, you need to claim this pension.

"An Other Rank joined at Age 18 on 31 December 1974, and was discharged on 31 December 1986. They had not served for 22 years, so they do not qualify for an immediate pension on discharge. However, they had met the criteria to qualify for a Preserved Pension. If they discharged in the rank of Sgt (OR6), their preserved pension was £1,687.56. When this becomes payable at age 60, it would be revalued in line with indexation. This means that its value on 31 December 2016 would be a pension of £4,363.49, and a lump sum of £13,090.47. In 2024, the annual rate of this pension would be £5,754.29."

RATHLIN ISLAND REMEMBERS

A Remembrance Service was held on Sunday 16 November 2025 on Rathlin Island, writes S/M John Pudney of Limavady Branch – Area 12 (Ireland). The solemn and deeply moving service was held in St Thomas' Parish Church on the island, drawing together veterans, serving personnel, civic leaders and island residents to honour those who made the ultimate sacrifice in Service.

Organised by the Ballycastle branch of the Royal British Legion, along with local branches representing the Royal Navy, Army and the RAF, the event reinforced Rathlin's long-standing maritime and military heritage. The service was led by Revd Patrick Barton, of Ballintoy, Dunseverick, and Rathlin Parish Churches, who delivered a heartfelt sermon reflecting on the themes of sacrifice, memory, and community.

Among those attending were the Lord Lieutenant for County Antrim, David



McCorkell, Alderman Richard Stewart, Deputy Mayor of Causeway Coast and Glens Borough Council, and Cllr Dawn Huggins, the Veterans' Champion on the council, both offering civic support and paying tribute alongside RNA Limavady Branch and RBL veterans. In the adjacent graveyard at St Thomas', more than ten wreaths were laid. These memorials honoured both identified and unknown Servicemen, including sailors who tragically lost

their lives at sea.

The ceremony embraced the full breadth of military service – Royal Navy, Army and RAF – and united different branches in a shared moment of reflection.

A particularly poignant moment followed as participants journeyed back towards Ballycastle aboard the Rathlin ferry.

The ferry made a stop at the spot some five miles off Rathlin Island where armoured cruiser HMS Drake was struck by a torpedo on 2 October 1917 while on convoy escort duties. The explosion wrecked two of the cruiser's engine rooms and a boiler room, killing 18 of her ship's company. Although the warship developed a list and lost her steam-powered steering, she managed to make it to Church Bay on the island and anchored in shallow water, allowing the rest of her ship's company of around 900 to safely land ashore before she capsized. Royal Navy Officer Barry McWilliams laid a wreath in the waters nearby, a deeply symbolic gesture to commemorate the sailors lost from that ship.

WE WILL REMEMBER THEM

The Royal Naval Association took pride of place at this year's Cenotaph Parade in London, standing front and centre as the nation came together to remember the fallen.

This year's event held special significance as the Association is marking its 75th anniversary – celebrating 75 years of service, camaraderie, and dedication to the Naval family.

The RNA had more than 120 members marching in its platoon, among whom were three World War 2 veterans.

Donald Coombe joined the war effort at just 16, having lied about his age after narrowly surviving the bombing of Hither Green station in South London. On D-Day, he played a vital role in readying the landing craft from the

British side, ensuring they were fit for the historic invasion.

Outside of his military duties, Donald was also a talented boxer.

His skill in the ring earned him recognition within the Royal Navy, where he helped secure the Navy Light Heavyweight title.

Betty Withers was just 14 years old when Britain declared war in 1939. By the age of 17-and-a-half, Betty had volunteered to join the Women's Royal Naval Service (WRNS, better known as the Wrens), driven by a sense of duty and a desire to contribute.

Assigned to Hayling Island, Betty served as a cook, a role that, while behind the scenes, was vital to the morale and readiness of the troops.

Her kitchen became a place of comfort and camaraderie, where meals were more than sustenance – they were a moment of normality in extraordinary

One of the most poignant moments

of Betty's service came on the eve of As Allied forces prepared for the largest seaborne invasion in history, Betty cooked the final supper for the men who would set out across the Channel the following morning, some never to return. **Continued on page 9**





Bill (William) Jones left school at 14 due to the outbreak of war.

He served as an Air Fitter/Metal Worker with the Fleet Air Arm, training with MONAB IV (Mobile Naval Air Base IV) before deploying to Australia and then Ponam Island in the Pacific.

Life on Ponam was harsh, with extreme heat, limited supplies, and dangerous wildlife, but Bill contributed to aircraft maintenance for the British Pacific Fleet during operations against Japan. Formed in 1950, the RNA represents the largest community of Royal Naval veterans, serving personnel, and their families, with nearly 25,000 members across more than 240 branches worldwide.

United under the enduring motto "Once Navy, Always Navy," the Association continues to provide lifelong friendship and support to all who have served. Around 120 RNA Shipmates – the largest contingent in the Association's history – marched past the Cenotaph in honour of those who gave their lives in service to their country.

Leading Column A was the RNA's General Secretary/Chief Executive Officer Bill Oliphant, symbolising the unity and strength of the Naval Family through 75 years of service and remembrance.

The Association's National Chairman, Andy Christie, who served 35 years in the Royal Navy including during the Falklands War, laid a wreath on behalf of all RNA members.

"For me, Remembrance is deeply personal," said Andy.

"My family's service stretches across both World Wars and beyond. "Marching today, I carried their memories and the shared spirit of every shipmate who stood the watch. "This 75th anniversary year reminds us

This 75th anniversary year reminds us that our bonds are as strong today as they ever were."

Among the marchers were several World War 2 veterans, including S/M John 'Jack' Trowbridge, aged 99, who served aboard HMS King George V during the Arctic Convoys.

"Each year I come to remember the shipmates who never made it home," said Jack.

"The faces may change, but the spirit never does.

"Seeing younger generations marching beside us fills me with pride – it means the Navy's heart still beats strong." As the Royal Naval Association looks back on 75 years of service and fellowship, it continues to honour the generations of men and women who have worn the Royal Navy uniform, past, present, and future.

From World War 2 veterans to today's serving sailors, the RNA remains a living testament to the resilience, camaraderie, and unbreakable bonds of the Naval family.

A grant from Royal Navy & Royal Marines Charity (RNRMC) and Greenwich Hospital helped RNA members from across the UK travel to London for the parade, ensuring shipmates of all generations could take part in this special anniversary year of remembrance.





CLOSE WATCH KEPT ON RUSSIAN SHIPS

The Royal Navy carried out two interceptions of Russian vessels in UK waters over two weeks in November, including monitoring an intelligence gathering vessel.

Plymouth-based HMS Somerset shadowed Russian research ship Yantar in the North Sea (pictured below) and kept watch round-the-clock for eight days as the vessel sailed northwards towards the Faroes.

Somerset worked closely with NATO allies, using a range of sensors and radars to report on every move. As Yantar lingered in UK's wider waters, its crew directed lasers at RAF P-8 pilots tracking it in a reckless and dangerous act. While tracking Yantar, Type 23 frigate Somerset and other

civilian ships in the area experienced GPS jamming, intended to be disruptive and a nuisance. Somerset's combat capabilities were not affected. HMS Somerset's Commanding Officer, Commander Matt Millyard, said: "The Royal Navy always has a ship held at notice to conduct these missions and HMS Somerset has been called upon to shadow the Yantar on two occasions this year as it entered UK waters. In the most recent operation HMS Somerset, working alongside RAF maritime patrol aircraft, maintained 24-hour surveillance of the Yantar to provide evidence of their activities." Patrol ship HMS Severn meanwhile was dispatched to monitor Russian

> and tanker Yelnya off the UK coast, joining allies in a 24-hour shadowing operation

as the Russian vessels sailed through the Dover Strait and westward through the English Channel (pictured below). Portsmouth-based Severn subsequently handed over monitoring duties to a NATO ally off the coast of Brittany, continuing to observe from a distance and remaining poised to react in the event of any unexpected activity. The Russian ships passed through UK waters without incident and followed recognised maritime routes. Both operations are routine for the Royal Navy but are nonetheless essential for the continuing security of the UK. Commander Grant Dalgleish, HMS Severn's Commanding Officer, said: "This tasking shows the value of our patrol ships and reinforces the Royal Navy's close liaison with our NATO allies in safeguarding the British people and protecting the internationally recognised waterways."

MALAYA AND BORNEO VETERANS PLAN FOR 2026 CENOTAPH PARADE

Membership of the National Malaya and Borneo Veterans Association (NMBVA) is steadily dwindling and in due course the Association will no longer be represented at events such as the Remembrance Parade at the Cenotaph in London.

This year out of 22 registrations for tickets, 19 people managed to attend – the other three sent messages explaining their absence (two working abroad and one incapacitated by a fall). Of the 19 people actually on parade, only 11 were official members of the NMBVA – the remaining eight were either carers or members of the RNA who held the PJM and/or the appropriate GSM.

The NMBVA had contacted the RNA when it became apparent that numbers were falling short, and knowing that the RNA contingent was oversubscribed, this resulted in five of the additional eight marchers. Every single individual

commented that they thoroughly enjoyed the day, including several who had never before taken part in the occasion. This feeling of euphoria might have been helped by the fact that it was a beautiful autumn day, very mild and with bright sunshine throughout.

All have committed to attending again next year, which is encouraging. The accompanying image shows most people smiling...

Members of the association were also shown on the televised coverage of the day, including close-up footage and



commentary as they approached the Cenotaph.

They were in the lead column so were very early in the parade. John Black, of the NMBVA, has already contacted both the RBL Cenotaph team and the BBC in advance of next year's planning to plead their case for both additional tickets and a prominent position as well as enhanced coverage during the broadcast, but only time will tell if their efforts will be successful.

As next year marks the 60th anniversary of the end of the Confrontation, John hopes that as many members as possible will make the effort to join them on Sunday 8 November.

leadership, strategic vision, and a heartfelt commitment to the people we serve.

"We are confident she will continue to drive the charity forward with energy, empathy, and integrity."

WAR MONUMENT IS REDEDICATED

RNA members joined World War 1 enthusiasts and descendants of men who fought in a distinguished yet little-known Royal Navy fighting formation to witness the rededication of a memorial in London.

The national monument to the Royal Naval Division – sailors who fought as infantry throughout World War 1 at major battles including Antwerp, Gallipoli, the Somme and Ypres – was rededicated in Horse Guards Parade four days after Remembrance Sunday.

The event, which was attended by senior Naval officers and serving personnel, marked the 100th anniversary year of the distinctive memorial being installed in the heart of the capital.

It was also 22 years to the day that the memorial was returned to the site, having been removed in World War 2 during construction of the Admiralty Citadel.

It was rebuilt at the Royal Naval College and rededicated in 1951, and remained there for more than 50 years. Thousands of men served in the unique division, which was originally formed using sailors who had not yet been allocated to ships at the beginning of the war in 1914. There were initial reservations, particularly in Army circles, about the creation of such a unit, but the RN Division developed into one of the elite fighting units of the British Expeditionary Force, winning admiration throughout the war.

Over the next four years, the division was repeatedly re-formed for new tasks. Some 47,000 men of the division became casualties, accounting for more than 40 per cent of the Royal Navy's losses during the war. Of that 47,000, around 11,500 sailors and Royal Marines died while serving their country.

Despite the fact that an increasing number of Army

personnel joined over the years, the division remained solidly Naval throughout: battalions were named after famous admirals – Drake, Anson, Hood and Nelson – rather than given numbers, and the men were seamen and petty officers, not privates and sergeants. Units flew the White Ensign, and sailors spoke of 'going ashore' when leaving camp.

The London memorial – designed by Sir Edwin Lutyens, the country's leading architect of the day – takes the unusual form of a fountain which, in the words of Winston Churchill (who was present at the original dedication in 1925, and was the man behind the division's creation) would give forth "not only the waters of honour, but also the waters of healing and the waters of hope".





HELP NEEDED WITH HISTORIC BOAT

A charity is working hard to save a World War 2 Motor Anti-Submarine Boat (MASB) – possibly the last surviving example which is in a condition where she could be saved.

MASB S32 is moored afloat on Salhouse Broad in Norfolk, but the charity – ASRWhaleback – intend to have her lifted out of the water within the next couple of months and taken to a safe storage where they can assess her condition and begin restoration. During remedial work on her to ensure she retains her shape when being lifted workers discovered what they believe are the remnants of the ASDIC originally fitted.

They have contacted ARL-Teddington to ask for details, but would appreciate any information regarding the type 134C ASDIC fitted to her.

Is there anyone in the RNA who could identify components and help them to fill in quite a number of gaps they have in her operational life? Those gaps also include those who crewed her – although they have possible names and ranks, they would appreciate any help you could give in this area as well.

S32 is registered on the Historic Ships

MASBs were mainly 63ft power boats designed and built as anti-submarine craft, though many had their depth charge apparatus removed in order to serve as air-sea rescue boats in the Channel, rescuing pilots and aircrew shot down in combat.

S32 was completed by the British Power



Boat Company on 24 September 1941 and went straight to Dover in 'Spitfire Alley', with some reports stating she had a Polish crew, though no firm evidence for this has been found.

More likely she was crewed by eight Royal Navy ratings and two Royal Naval Reserve officers, and was used not in her anti-submarine role but as a Air Sea Rescue boat.

She was fitted with a Type 134 Anti-Submarine Detection Investigation Committee (ASDIC) kit, which is the historical name for what is now known as sonar.

S32 rescued her first aviator – a Canadian fighter pilot – on 13 October 1941 in the Channel, and went on to rescue a number of other aviators. Fuller details can be found in the boat's record section on the ASRWhaleback website.

RAILWAY ROUTES OF REMEMBRANCE

On 11 November The Veterans Charity's annual Routes of Remembrance initiative marked a powerful step forward in its mission to carry wreaths and tributes on meaningful journeys of remembrance — this year with special significance, featuring the participation of Her Majesty The Oueen.

The event began at Chippenham railway station, where Queen Camilla boarded a specially-designated early-morning service of the Great Western Railway (GWR). With communities gathered on the platform, including members of The Veterans Charity and local schoolchildren presenting wreaths of crocheted poppies, the train carried the message of remembrance through the railway network to London Paddington station.

At Paddington, the wreaths were laid on Platform 1's war memorial in a moving service. Queen Camilla, alongside veterans and railway industry personnel, observed the two-minutes' silence, attended a performance by the Military Wives Choir, and met reservists and veterans working within the rail sector.

The Queen spoke to the Trustee who created the concept in

2020, who explained how it was an idea initially to help one elderly veteran in Cornwall.

The 2025 Routes of Remembrance event placed special emphasis on the enduring link between railways and military service, recognising decades of service from wartime mobilisation to present-day veterans stepping into rail industry roles.

Whilst this year marks the 200th anniversary of the creation of the railways, it was also 170 years ago that a dedicated railway was built in Crimea to support the British Army. As part of this year's commemoration more than 250 wreaths were transported into London via GWR services from more than 60 stations across the network.

The 2025 edition of Routes of Remembrance was a reminder that remembrance is carried through more than ceremonies – it travels by rail, by road, by sea, and by the dedication of many.

This year Routes have visited South America, Antarctica, Asia and many other countries across Europe. The only continent not to have been visited, yet, is Africa and plans are well under way to complete the continents in 2026.

WAR VETERANS TO RECEIVE SUPPORT FOR OVERSEAS VISITS

World War 2 veterans will be supported by the government to travel to overseas commemorative events, ensuring those who served in that conflict can attend remembrance ceremonies whilst they are still able.

The government recognises the profound importance of enabling World War 2 veterans to pay their respects at the sites where they served and where their comrades fell.

The announcement came ahead of the publication of the government's new Veterans Strategy on 10 November, which outlines further ambitions on celebrating veterans and recognising them as a strategic national asset. Minister of State Lord Coaker announced the commitment following his attendance at several European commemorations earlier this year, where he witnessed first-hand the importance of these events for veterans.

Lord Coaker said: "This year's Second World War commemorations in Europe reminded the nation of the importance of coming together to honour those who saved our country from Nazi tyranny 80

years ago

"I have had the privilege to attend commemorations marking the Polish contribution to Operation Market Garden in Poland, the Battle of Arnhem in the Netherlands, and the liberation of Bergen-Belsen in Germany.

"These events strengthen ties with NATO allies, but also at a human level, to recognise the extraordinary courage and contribution of Allied nations in achieving peace.

"This government will support those remaining veterans of the Second World War who wish to travel to overseas commemorative events next year and beyond.

'Our upcoming Veterans Strategy will outline further ambitions on celebrating veterans and recognising them as a strategic national asset.

"While we can never repay their generation, we are committed to helping them to remember, reconnect and pay their respects in the place where so many fell for our freedom."

Minister for Veterans and People Louise Sandher-Jones said: "Having attended

the Afghanistan memorial event at the National Memorial Arboretum and felt the power of marking such anniversaries alongside those you served with, I understand how vital these occasions are for our Second World War veterans too.

"That's why this government is committed to funding travel support for Second World War veterans attending overseas remembrance events, starting next year.

"This is about ensuring that those who gave so much can return to honour the friends they lost whilst they still can. 'Our forthcoming Veterans Strategy will set out how we're putting veterans at the heart of this government's priorities – and supporting our Second World War generation to attend these commemorations is where that commitment begins."

Veteran Jack Mortimer, 102, from Leeds, who was a corporal with the Royal Army Ordnance Corps during World War Two and was part of the Allied forces that landed on Sword Beach on D-Day on 6 June 1944, welcomed the announcement.

"Going back to Normandy means everything to those of us who are still here," he said.

"It's where we lost so many good men, and it's important that we can pay our respects to the friends who never came home.

"At my age, these journeys aren't easy, but they matter more than anything. "This support from the government will help veterans like me make that trip whilst we still can.

'We owe it to our comrades to be there, to remember them where they fell. I'm very grateful for this commitment."



CRUISE PASSENGERS PAY THEIR RESPECTS

Members of the **HMS Dido Association** recently returned from a five-night Mystery Cruise, care of Fred Olsen Cruise Lines.

On 9 November, Remembrance Sunday, they were off the coast of Germany near Hamburg. At 1100, with the approval and assistance of the Captain and crew of MS Borealis, they held a Remembrance service on the ship's quarterdeck. The ship sounded its horns for the start of the two-minute silence, and once again at the end. With a piper in attendance, and after a few words, they cast two biodegradable wreaths on to the sea. What they didn't realise was that many of the passengers on board were with them watching the ceremony. On completion, we all enjoyed a tot of run care of Fred Olsen.

GREENWICH HOSPITAL AWARDS GRANT TO FIGHTING WITH PRIDE

Greenwich Hospital has awarded a £248,000 grant to Fighting With Pride to support the charity's work improving the health and wellbeing of LGBT+ veterans and families affected by the historic Armed Forces 'gay ban'.

Founded in 2020, Fighting With Pride works to ensure that LGBT+ veterans, particularly those dismissed or forced to conceal their identity before the lifting of

the ban in January 2000, are recognised, supported, and not further disadvantaged.

The charity also plays a key role in helping affected individuals navigate financial reparations from the fund established by the UK government.

The three-year grant will help strengthen the charity's regional network through funding towards key veterans' community worker (VCW) posts, marketing activity, and administrative capacity.

The VCW roles focus on building awareness, confidence, and community connections to encourage veterans to seek advice and support and to register for government compensation.



Where appropriate, people can also be referred to suitable specialist welfare and health services.

Through its befriending and peersupport networks, the charity continues to rebuild trust, belonging, and inclusion across the Armed Forces family, ensuring that LGBT+ serving personnel and veterans feel valued, understood, and welcomed home.

Deirdre Mills, Director of Greenwich Hospital, said: "Fighting With Pride plays a unique role in addressing the long-lasting impact of the historic ban and ensuring that all who have served are treated with dignity and respect as valued members of the Armed Forces community.

"We are proud to fund this work to help restore confidence, rebuild connections, and ensure that eligible Royal Navy veterans can register and receive compensation."

Peter Gibson, Chief Executive Officer, Fighting With Pride, said: "This funding from Greenwich Hospital is transformative. It allows us to reach more LGBT+ veterans, help them to rebuild their lives, and ensure those once cast out of the Armed Forces are fully welcomed home."

SALFORD'S MARITIME HERITAGE

Celebrating heritage, service, and a weekend to remember

Some may say Salford is far from the sea, but the city's connection to the Royal Navy runs as deep as the River Irwell and as wide as the oceans themselves.

From the moment Queen Victoria sailed into Salford aboard the Royal Yacht Enchantress to open the Manchester Ship Canal in 1894, Salford has carried a strong maritime identity – one that continues to shape our community today.

A Port with a Proud Past

Salford was granted city status by Royal Charter in 1926 – 100 years ago next year.

For decades, Salford Quays thrived as the third busiest port in the UK, handling vessels from across the globe.

Among the ships that once arrived here were two captured German U-boats brought to the Quays after World War 2. The city also played host to a Royal Navy Store in Worsley for the former RNAS Risley, located inside the Anti-Aircraft Operations Room now standing within the grounds of RHS Bridgewater.

This facility served as an important operational hub during the war years.

War, Sacrifice, and Resilience

During both World Wars, the Salford docks were vital arteries of national supply, moving munitions, equipment, and essential cargo that kept the country functioning.

But this came at a price. The 'Christmas Blitz' of 1940 brought devastation to Salford, claiming nearly 700 lives and injuring more than 2,000.

The traces of that night can still be seen today on memorial stones in Weaste Cemetery.

Salford's role in the Battle of the Atlantic was equally significant.

Ships leaving these inland waters sailed into treacherous seas, many never returning home.

Over the years, submarines, destroyers, frigates, and even HMS Bronington – once captained by King Charles III – have berthed here, strengthening Salford's enduring bond with the Royal Navy.

A Living Naval Legacy

That connection continues today. The Royal Marines Reserve at Haldane Barracks, the Sea Cadets, University Royal Naval Unit Manchester, and the ship's bell of HMS Salford displayed at Broughton House all ensure the Navy remains present in the lifeblood of our community.

Even Barton Aerodrome has hosted Royal Navy aircraft over the years,



reminding us that Salford's Naval heritage touches land, sea, and air. Salford Rum, a brand inspired by the exotic spices once unloaded at the Quays, pays homage to the long-standing Naval tradition of the tot, adding a uniquely local flavour to the story.

A Weekend of Fellowship, Heritage, and Celebration

This special Conference weekend brings shipmates and guests together from across the country, offering a programme that blends history, remembrance, culture, and camaraderie.

- Friday evening (12 June): We begin at the Central 11 bar with live entertainment, a warm welcome, guest appearances, and RNA merchandise for sale. This is also the time to book your free boat tour around the Quays, taking place on Saturday afternoon.
- Saturday morning and afternoon (13 June): Delegates gather at The Lowry Theatre for the RNA National Conference, held on ground steeped in maritime history.
- Saturday evening: A three-course Mess Dinner at the Imperial War Museum North provides a memorable highlight. Dining beside the Ship Canal, attendees will reflect on the Navy's legacy while enjoying the company of shipmates old and new. The evening begins with a drinks reception beneath the Museum's suspended Harrier, an iconic aircraft that sets a dramatic tone for the night. The evening will also feature the museum's renowned Big Picture Show – a powerful, immersive audio-visual experience that fills the walls of the main gallery with film, sound, and light. It provides an evocative backdrop for an evening dedicated to remembrance and fellowship.

Adding further excitement, you may also spot familiar faces from the BBC and ITV around the Quays across the weekend, helping to share Salford's story with the wider nation.

The Council is also in discussions with Transport for Greater Manchester to provide **free transport for veterans**, ensuring that all who wish to take part can do so fully and without obstacle, connecting Manchester City Centre and Salford Quays.

A Sunday of Reflection: The Drumhead Service (14 June)

On Sunday, the weekend will conclude with a traditional **Drumhead Service** at Salford Quays—a solemn and dignified act of remembrance.

This historic Naval ceremony echoes the improvised services once held on the battlefield, where drums were stacked to form a makeshift altar.

t will offer a meaningful moment to honour those who served, those who sacrificed, and those who continue to uphold the values of the Royal Navy.

Looking to the Future

As we look ahead, 2026 will mark the centenary of Salford receiving its Royal Charter – a fitting moment to reflect on a century of civic pride and service. It is especially meaningful that the RNA gathers here during this important milestone.

Not bad for an inland city, eh? This truly is **a weekend to remember** – a celebration of heritage, unity, and the enduring spirit of Salford.





CONTACT AT CHRISTMAS

Traditionally, Christmas is a time for families and friends to come together and celebrate the festive period.

It can also be a difficult and challenging time for separated parents and their children

So, what can be done to help parents navigate this time?

Early conversations

Ideally, talk about the next school holiday before the end of the preceding break, for example, Christmas discussions during October half-term.

Early conversations help avoid unnecessary last-minute changes or disagreements.

Try to be proactive rather than reactive – consider making plans in advance, and recording the agreement in writing.

Festive period vs Christmas Day

Christmas Day is one day – the festive magic can last for weeks! It may be that one parent struggles with the idea that they will not wake up with their child(ren) on Christmas Day, but celebrating Christmas is not exclusive to

From experience, Christmas
Day handovers can also be quite
overwhelming – for the parents, and their
children.

Rather than focusing solely on Christmas Day, think about the entire period and the longer-term arrangements, such as alternating years so that the children wake up with each parent in turn.

Communication

If you have worked hard to agree the arrangements over the festive break, do your best to stick to them.

Time management is even more important during Christmas and helps avoid unnecessary disagreement or conflict.

Arrive on time to handovers (make sure you have agreed in advance who is responsible for drop-offs and collections, and specific times/locations) and if there are any issues, let the other parent know at the earliest opportunity.

Children's feelings

Christmas can be challenging for separated parents, and it can be equally difficult for the children too.

This can be avoidable. Keep the children away from any dispute or disagreement and avoid exposure to adult issues or age-inappropriate conversation. It's important to remember that the

children's feelings and wellbeing should be the primary concern, and their happiness will depend on how the contact arrangements around the festive break are managed.

This approach is not just exclusive to Christmas and should apply in all circumstances.

It is also considered by the Family
Court when determining the contact
arrangements if parents cannot agree.
There is no one-size-fits-all for
Christmas and the wider arrangements.
Consider what is best for you, your
children and extended family.
Do not, however, ask the child(ren)
where they want to spend Christmas.
This places pressure on the child and
brings them into adult conflict – and
we've established the importance of
avoiding exposure to parental dispute
and inappropriate conversations.

New traditions!

If this is your first year as a separated family, think about a new Christmas tradition that can be exclusive to your new routine, such as special trips to see Santa, meals or craft activities.

Christmas might look a little different now, so why not make it the best yet?

What happens if it does not work?

If arrangements break down, it is important to be proactive rather than reactive.

Keep communication calm but make a thorough note of what is disputed. Be willing to compromise if you can. Can this be resolved during the festive break, or are there underlying issues? If the arrangements are pursuant to a court order, it is important to consider prompt legal advice.

Have a wonderful Christmas (to those who celebrate) and enjoy the break. Hopefully the guidance above encourages parents to ensure their Christmas is as amicable as possible and to allow contact to take place effectively.

AREA 7 VOLUNTEERS UNITE IN WALES TO BOOST SKILLS AND WELLBEING

RNA Area 7 held an inaugural training day and gettogether for our volunteers, aimed at strengthening their ability to support our shipmates in Wales, and to look after their own wellbeing.

The event, at HMS Cambria in Cardiff, brought together RNA members, associate members, new volunteers and long-standing shipmates for a session focused on enhancing knowledge of the range of support available, completing key training and exchanging ideas for best practice.

The day included a presentation by the Veterans Welfare Group, who outlined their services during transition from Service life into the veteran community; an overview of the

RNA structure, roles and future plans from Jon Everett, RNA Welfare & Wellbeing Support Coordinator; and a presentation on looking after your own wellbeing by Jo Johnson, voluntary Area 7 Welfare and Wellbeing Officer, and Training Manager at leading UK Charity Grassroots Suicide Prevention, who co-ordinated the event.

The workshop also enabled Enhanced DBS Checks and ID Cards to be processed, plus core safeguarding training to be completed.

GREENWICH ENGAGES FOR RECOVERY

Greenwich Hospital has awarded a £79,000 grant to the BOWRA Foundation in support of its Engage to Recover programme, which aims to support former Royal Navy veterans and their families recovering from stroke, brain injuries and neurological conditions.

The Engage to Recover programme delivers tailored physical activity and wellbeing initiatives that get veterans working towards recovery and is inclusive of families.

The programme helps to rebuild resilience, restore confidence, and strengthen family relationships. Progress and impact are assessed through ongoing surveys, alongside attendance data and qualitative feedback collected annually. This award builds on Greenwich Hospital's previous £47,500 grant, which

enabled the BOWRA Foundation to expand its physical activity programme led by a dedicated Veterans Activities Manager.

Founded in 2014 by Lt Col Mark Bowra, a Special Boat Service officer who suffered a life-changing stroke at age 39, BOWRA draws from Mark's own recovery journey to deliver a wide range of imaginative and inclusive activities that foster camaraderie and promote physical fitness and mental wellbeing. In addition to its activity programmes, the BOWRA Foundation distributes BOWRA Bags—innovative collections of tools and aids designed to improve dexterity, mobility, memory, communication, and independence. Deirdre Mills, Director of Greenwich Hospital, said: "At Greenwich Hospital, we believe that recovery is not just about rehabilitation – it's about restoring hope, connection, and purpose.

"The BOWRA Foundation's Engage to Recover programme captures that spirit perfectly, empowering veterans and their families to rebuild their lives together after injury.

"We are helping to expand a programme that reflects the courage, resilience, and needs of the Royal Navy community." Sue Mosley, Chief Executive of Bowra, said: "We want to thank Greenwich Hospital for their continued trust and support.

"This funding allows us to reach more Royal Navy veterans and families with our Engage to Recover programme, helping them overcome physical and mental challenges together.

"Our mission is to promote recovery through shared experience, resilience, and teamwork, values that lie at the very heart of the Armed Forces community."

JERVIS BAY AND RNA BERMUDA

The RNA Branch was started in Bermuda in February 1959 with 47 members, but by 1964 that number had been reduced to only 11 people, writes Padre the Revd Fr David Addington RNR, Chaplain to Bermuda Branch and Chaplain Emeritus and Past Chairman, Board of Management of the Bermuda Sailors' Home Inc. Disbanded at that time, it was reinstated in August 1982.

2004 was the final curtain call for the RNA in Bermuda. The last Officers and Members decided to lay up the Standard in the chapel of the Mariners' Club of the Bermuda Sailors' Home, their natural home and de facto HQ.

We were entitled to a civic service in the Cathedral and a place in the Warriors

Chapel there (which includes the Battle Ensign of HMS Bermuda), but the Home would gladly accept the trust and honour our Standard.

Accordingly, a full and very fitting service of Laying-up according to RNA Ceremonial was held on Sunday 3 October 2004 at 1230 hours, which included an Act of Remembrance, under the patronage of our Patron His Excellency The Governor Sir John Vereker and with an address given by Capt Alan Brooks RN (Retd).

Included were the Naval Prayer and Hymn, the Lesson from Matthew 25: 31-40 read by Lt Cdr (SCC) Derek Taylor RNR, former CO of the Bermuda Sea Cadet Corps, and concluding with The Blessing by the Chaplain and the singing of the National Anthem.

The Royal Navy Base in Bermuda was closed in 1995, so visits by RN ships had been reduced. However, HMS Richmond had recently been in (as guardship HMS Monmouth made her way home) and she had been bringing relief to the storm-torn islands of the Caribbean after Hurricanes Ivan and Jeanne.

During its existence the RNA provided much to the civic and community life of our beloved Bermuda.

Every 11 November at 0900 we would hold a brief ceremony at Albouy's Point. A sundial memorial there commemorates the gallant action of the Armed Merchant Cruiser HMS Jervis Bay in the dark days of World War 2.

The inscription reads: "Captain Fogarty Fegen VC, RN The Officers and Ship's Company of HMS Jervis Bay Who cheerfully gave their lives in successful defence of their convoy, fighting their ship to the last against hopeless odds. November 5th, 1940". 'Be thou faithful unto death'.

They had operated out of Bermuda. By their sacrifice they held off the German pocket battleship Admiral Scheer long enough to allow the convoy to escape, but at the loss of their ship and all but 60 of their ship's company of 200.

When RNA Bermuda could no longer hold the Parade, the Sea Cadets took on the responsibility and they continue to do this duty. It is usual for the Premier and Members of Government to attend before the Main Parade at the Cenotaph.

Of our Band of Brothers and Sisters, some had already

Crossed the Bar by the time I took the photograph (above) in 2006 and nearly all have gone over since.

member of the Royal Navy, Royal Marines or RFA who dies in service, the charity ensured that Claire and her children, Georgia and Fraser, received immediate financial support.

"RNRMC gave us the breathing space we desperately needed," Claire said. "It meant we could focus on our grief and on supporting the children, rather than worrying about the immediate financial strain."

NETWORK OF SUPPORT CENTRES IS PART OF NEW VETERANS STRATEGY

Veterans support centres are to be to be rolled out across the country as the government launches its transformational Veterans Strategy. The aim of the initiative is to transform government support for our heroes and recognise their invaluable contribution across the country.

Key points in the announcement include:

- £27m in government funding going live for local bids, turbocharging the network of recognised Valour centres;
- The first Veterans Strategy in seven years will transform government support for former Service personnel and recognise their invaluable contribution across the country;
- The Strategy has been developed alongside the Strategic Defence Review and the Armed Forces Covenant, committing a new £12m fund for veteran housing. More than 1.8 million veterans across the UK will benefit from the new network of local support centres. The new centres will help improve access to support services such as health, housing and employment, and may extend to finance, wellbeing, welfare and integration into society. The local centres will fundamentally transform how assistance is provided, offering the first coordinated national

network of support centres.
They will connect to a new Valour
headquarters within the Ministry of
Defence, with regional centres and

field officers working in communities. On top of the £50m Valour fund, the government is also committing an additional £12m to vital homelessness services through the Reducing Veteran Homelessness programme. Op Fortitude will also be extended, putting the service that has already housed over 1,000 veterans on a sustainable footing.

These programmes will deliver three years of support services across the UK for veterans at risk of or experiencing homelessness, fulfilling the Prime Minister's pledge that homes will be there for heroes. This strategy, like the Armed Forces Covenant, applies equally across the UK, with its vision, themes and priority outcomes a shared endeavour between UK and devolved governments.

The strategy has benefited from the inputs of veterans themselves and from organisations in all parts of the UK – across the public, private and third sector – that work with veterans and the wider Armed Forces community.

As part of the government's Plan for Change, the new strategy recognises veterans as national assets, whose unique skills strengthen communities, boost the economy and enhance national security.

The strategy is built on three priorities:

- Celebrating those who have served;
- Harnessing veterans' skills, and

■ Ensuring effective support for those who need it.

Defence Secretary John Healey MP said: "The first duty of government is to keep our country safe, and that is only possible through the extraordinary men and women in our Armed Forces.

"Our nation owes a duty to those who have served, and this new Strategy recognises veterans as one of our greatest assets.
"These announcements will boost

support for veterans across the UK, from better healthcare to housing to jobs. Our message to veterans and the Armed Forces community is simple: we are on your side." Minister for Veterans and People Louise Sandher-Jones MP said: "Our new Veterans Strategy fundamentally resets how we celebrate and support the remarkable men and women who have served in our Armed Forces, whilst harnessing their invaluable talent and skills across society. "At the core of the strategy is Valour - backed by £50 million in funding. From today, organisations can bid for the first tranche of this funding to become part of a network of support centres across the country for our heroes – ensuring easier access to the assistance they need, when and where they need it.

"This strategy has been informed by those who it seeks to benefit: veterans, and we remain committed to stand by those who have stood by us."

Valour will foster the enterprising spirit of veteran charities, better connect local and national services and ensure veterans' support is truly data driven. Valour-recognised support centres will open from spring 2026, offering veterans a single contact point for support needs.

The announcement comes after the government announced a commitment to support World War 2 veterans to travel to overseas commemorative events and expanded the eligibility for the Nuclear Test Medal.

Developed alongside the Strategic Defence Review and the Armed Forces Covenant, the new strategy forms part of the government's Plan for Change commitment to strong

national security foundations.

SIR DAVID TAKES CHARGE

Vice Admiral Sir David Steel will become The Poppy Factory's next President, serving as lead ambassador for the charity in its mission to help veterans and families on the path to employment.

Sir David will formally take up the role at the start of 2026, following the retirement of Surg Rear Admiral Lionel Jarvis, who will step down after seven years' distinguished service as President and a further 11 years as a vice patron and committed supporter of the charity.

After joining the Royal Navy in 1979, Sir David enjoyed a wide-ranging career at sea, including as the Logistics Commander on board the aircraft carrier HMS Invincible, supporting operations in Kosovo and Macedonia, and air operations over Iraq.

Ashore, his qualifications as a barrister were put to good use in all his policy and personnel appointments. Sir David served as Second Sea Lord from 2012 to 2015 and as Governor of Gibraltar from 2020 to 2024.

Sir David will become the lead representative of the Poppy Factory as it celebrates 100 years since first moving to its iconic home in Richmond upon Thames.

The charity still employs a production team in Richmond, making around 90,000 Remembrance wreaths for the Royal British Legion each year, special wreaths including for the Royal Family, and organising the annual Field of Remembrance in the grounds of Westminster Abbey.



DECEMBER SWINGING THE LAMP

On **10 December 1942** destroyer HMS Roebuck was launched at the Scotts shipyard on the Clyde, but without the usual ceremony. In fact, the 2,470-ton R-class warship was launched without any ceremony at all, and somewhat earlier than expected...

Roebuck was ordered in May 1940 but work on her was delayed until the following year, when she was laid down on 19 June 1941 – at that stage of the war repair work took priority.

Even then work on her was relatively slow, and by the end of 1942 she was still only partially completed.

On the night of 10 December a large-scale German air raid on Glasgow also hit the docks to the west of the city centre, and one near-miss explosion caused Roebuck to rattle down the slip in her unfinished state, promptly sinking in the Clyde where she remained for another three months until she was salvaged and finally completed in May 1943, three years after the initial order.

After that halting start, it was all systems go for the versatile warship, who spent her entire war far from home waters.

After sea trials joined the Fleet on 10 June 1943, sailing to Scapa Flow to work up with units of the Home Fleet. But she had already been assigned to the 11th Destroyer Flotilla of the Eastern Fleet, and after some preparation in August she sailed for Freetown and on to the Indian Ocean, where she rendezvoused with other ships of her

flotilla which were deployed on convoy escort duties and patrols.

Over the following two years Roebuck – the 15th ship of that name in the Royal Navy – proved a real workhorse in operation after operation around the Indian Ocean and Far East.

At various times she screened major units of the Fleet, such as aircraft carriers HM Ships Victorious and Indomitable on Op Crimson (attacks on Sabang and Sumatra), carried out naval bombardments such as Op Office and Op Training (Cocos Islands), and Op Gable (Matapan), and also provided defensive screening for major ships on Op Dracula (Rangoon landings) and Op Balsam (reconnaissance in Malaysia.

In August 1945 Roebuck was earmarked for a role in the large-scale landings planned for Malaya (Op Zipper) but the Japanese surrender rendered the plans pointless, so she was instead diverted to Singapore to support the reoccupation of the territory until she sailed to Simon's Town for a refit in October.

After the war, the destroyer was converted to a Type 15 anti-submarine frigate in 1952, following on from her sisters HM Ships Relentless and Rocket.

She joined the 5th Frigate Squadron the following year when she also took part in the Fleet Review celebrating the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II.

The twilight of her career was spent mainly in the Dartmouth Training Squadron (1957-60), and after refit she joined the 17th Escort Squadron until she paid off into reserve in Plymouth in 1962.

She remained in reserve for some time before she was stripped of all useful equipment and sold to the British Iron and Steel Corporation, who had her towed to the breakers yard at Inverkeithing on 8 August 1968.

IMAGE FORMAT FOR SUBMISSION AND ACCEPTABLE METHODS OF DIGITAL ENHANCEMENT

- 1. Stills images must be submitted in the electronic format JPEG at the highest quality.
- 2. Digital enhancement of images is **only** allowed to clean and balance to a correct reproduction of the original conditions. Tools that are considered acceptable:
 - a. Brightness control.
 - b. Burning and dodging.
 - c. Contrast control.
 - d. Colour balance.
 - e. Levels or Curves.
 - f. Saturation.
 - g. Unsharp mask.
 - h. Converting a colour image to black and white or sepia tone.
- 3. Manipulation of the composite elements of images and HDR are **not permitted**.
- 4. Where necessary, tools may also be used to remove sensor artefacts from the image.
- 5. Video entries should all be shot with the understanding they will be judged and viewed in a traditional widescreen film format. Landscape video will make better use of screen area during judging, but portrait format can be entered.
- 6. All video entries are to be exported as 1080p 25fps in either .mp4 or .mov format.
- 7. Grading and aftereffects can be used on videos, but composite elements of content shouldn't be changed.
- 8. The Royal Navy Photographic Specialist Advisor retains the right to reject photographs or videos deemed not suitable, manipulated or over enhanced.


